

We strongly recommend utilizing public transportation if possible. The Morgan CTA station (Green & Pink lines) is a 6 minute walk from the venue, and Union Station / Ogilvie are 5-8 minutes away by Uber/Lyft. If you are driving, there is paid street parking and a paid public parking garage under the building (entrance on Carroll Ave).



Bring a visual artifact for your presentation.

- This could look like a laptop with slides, poster, design, prototype, or anything else that helps show or explain your work.
- If you are bringing your laptop, don't forget your charger! Pro tip: Charge your laptop the night before.

Bring a photo ID (school ID is okay).

A photo ID is what will let you enter the building, so it's key to bring one!



Is there a winner at the showcase?

No! The Student Research Showcase is a celebration of your hard work rather than a competition. This is an opportunity to share your research, network with peers and professionals, and potentially get some presentation practice in if you will be presenting at school after the showcase.

What do I wear?

What presentation group am I in?

To check your presentation group, reference the <u>registration page</u>. You will either be presenting in Group A (11:15-45) or Group B (11:50-12:20).

Will my mentor be at the showcase?

Check with your mentor if you have not already talked about the showcase! Many mentors are located in Chicago and will be attending.

Can my family come to the showcase?

Yes! Please invite your family and guests to support you at the showcase. Attendance is free, but they will need to <u>register</u> by Wednesday, April 16th.
